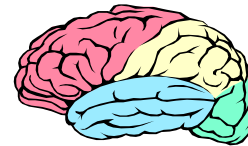

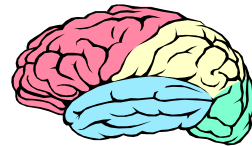

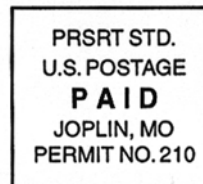

Learning Objectives

- Based upon increased knowledge of blast injury, the participants will be able to identify the acute and chronic pathologic changes occurring after TBI, and how these changes are related to long-term functional outcome.
- Safety officers, public health officials, hospital administrators, first responders, and clinicians will consider the physical conditions of large public buildings and their relevance for a potential civilian disaster including: safety precautions; how to anticipate medical supplies and facilities for a disaster; how to develop appropriate training programs to cope with prevention of and response to major disasters.
- Participants will consider a wide range of trauma, physiological and psychological etiologies in their diagnosis and treatment protocol. Participants will be alerted to unusual or rare conditions of their patients, and otherwise implement appropriate case management.
- Participants will be taught current assessment and rehabilitation procedures for polytrauma victims, i.e. multiple injuries to the head, face, body, etc., accompanied by significant emotional stress.
